**RECENT RESEARCH ON THE 1727 IMMIGRANT SAMUEL
OBERHOLTZER FAMILY by Harold Millhouse Kilheffer
Update Bulletin August 2006**

In this article, it was suggested that Frena Oberholtzer, wife of Jacob Cety, was the daughter of Samuel Oberholtzer [SL] born ca 1700. After further research, I am inclined to believe that she was a sister of Samuel because she was born ca 1710 in Germany. Her husband Jacob Cety was born in 1709 Meckesheim, Heidelberg, Germany. He was a Mennonite and his family was part of the migration from Switzerland. Jacob came to Lancaster County, PA where he bought land in Hempfield and Donegal Township which he sold a part of to Ulrich Engle, one of the founders of the River Brethren denomination. I feel this is a good clue as to where Samuel Oberholtzer came from and he probably married Elizabeth in Heidelberg. We would appreciate any suggestions as to where to do more research on Samuel Oberholtzer in Heidelberg, Germany.

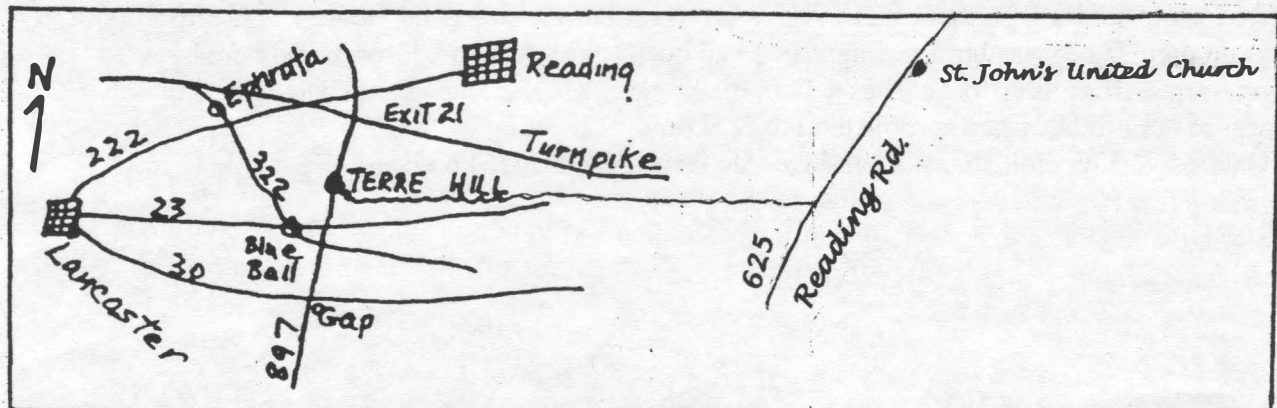
HOW TO GET TO THE REUNION

A MESSAGE FROM THE GRAVE

Glenn Toothman of Waynesburg, PA has invented a Memory Medallion which digitally stores a person's biography and picture on a quarter-sized computer memory device encased in stainless steel which is embedded in stainless steel in a tombstone. The medallion allows anyone to retrieve its information with a special wand and display it on a hand-held or laptop computer. The downloadable data can include a link to a website that has even more information about the deceased, from a family tree to voice or video recordings.

DANIEL JOHN OVERHOLSER [JM036]

I had a request for information about Daniel J. Overholser, son of John R. and Christena Stutsman of Elkhart County, Indiana. I had nothing in my files about him and my Indiana census records didn't show a Daniel but I did find John D. Overholser, born the right time, who was the son of John R. Overholser. In the 1880 census, he is John D. age 2 and in the 1900, he is Daniel born 1877. This family used the first name in one census and the middle in the next which can be most confusing. Here is Daniel J. Overholser and family-

TWO SONS OF NICHOLAS CLAUS OVERHOLT [IC341]

Nicholas Claus Overholt settled in Iowa from Canada and I located sons Lewis, Frank and Albert in Minnesota but there was no information on C. W. or George. I heard from someone researching his Charles W. Overholt who had lived in White County, Tennessee before moving to Davidson County, TN and then to St. Louis, Missouri. We agreed that this was the son of Nicholas Overholt. In researching White County, I found an 1891 tax census which had no Overholt but there was a Charles Overhall and a G. C. Overhall. I wondered if it was a wrong transcription of the name Overholt. Later that day I had a sudden idea and I pulled out my Tennessee file. In the 1900 census for Davidson County, TN, there was Charles Overholt born in Iowa and George C. Overholt born in Iowa and their father was born in Canada! I had been trying to locate George and here he was having moved from Iowa to Tennessee with his brother. George appears to have stayed in Tennessee but brother Charles moved on to St. Louis, Missouri.

AN OLD CLOCK

A letter written to Rev. Thomas H. Krick, Coplay, PA from Rev. I. E. Oberholtzer, Shansi, China dated February 7, 1927

I want to tell you about a little clock that has lately come into my possession which may serve as a stake to guide us in our researches. I have for many years known that Rev. Christian had a grandfathers hall clock that he handed down to his grandson, but I was never able to locate where it had gotten to. The last time I was home I accidently located it and have been two years in getting it into our family. The clock is now mine and can be seen in my father's front room in Elizabeth-town. It is a 24 hour clock made in London by a Benjamin Lamb in the year 1676. It has metal works and a beautiful brass face. It has no moon but shows the months of the year. It is now 250 years old and was 100 years old already when my great great grandfather owned it. It was already 50 years old when 1st Samuel lived. Where our Christian got a hold of it I have no knowledge. Whether he bought it secondhand, or got it through his wife or whether his father gave it to him are all conjectures. My opinion, however, is that he got it from his father. Supposing that he was the oldest living son of II Martin, he would be the one most likely to get it. I do not think he got it through his wife, for she had at least one other brother who would have gotten it. He lived near the old homestead while the 3 sisters all married men in Mt. Joy Township. The second-hand goods of that kind was not likely for sale then. Clock historians say that the early clocks were made to order and only the more financially able were able to own them. If this clock came from II Martin the same questions again may be asked and so if it came down from I Samuel, was it inherited, gotten through the wife or was it bought second-hand? It being an English clock throws one off the track a little. The clock never found its way to Switzerland, then back to America when I Samuel arrived in 1727, for the Swiss have always been clock makers themselves and better ones than the English. It may, of course, be that he or another ancestor lived in London for some time as many did and buy it while there or as passing through. And yet I cannot think of these fleeing persecuted Palatinates, poor as they were, buying such cumbersome freight to take on an unknown sea journey. It is easier to believe that one of the old Oberholtzers married an English wife who would naturally take to a native clock. I give you this clock information that you may get your bearings if perchance you find a record of a clock in any wills.

Note: I Samuel is SL Samuel Oberholtzer, II Martin is SL2 Martin Oberholtzer, Rev Christian is SL22 Christian Oberholtzer and the grandfather referred to is SL2256 Christian L. Oberholtzer.

My understanding is that the clock was given to the son of Rev. I.E. Oberholtzer, Rev. Henry Oberholtzer who, I believe, has given it to his nephew.

UPDATE

In the August 2005 BULLETIN on page 3, there was a query about Sarah Ann Overholtzer who married 9/30/1850 John H. Dellinger. Her parents were unknown but on the Internet recently, I found she was the daughter of Samuel Overholser and Catherine Hinkel (JL214). Posted was a "voluntary consent to the marriage of my said daughter Sarah Overholser to John Dellinger". It was to The Clerk of Shenandoah County Courts, dated 9/28/1850 and signed by Samuel Overholser.

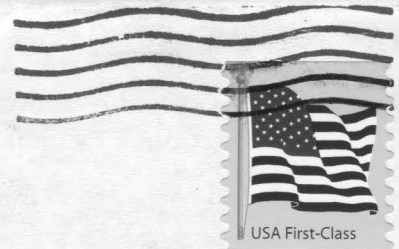
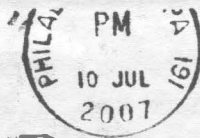
