MINUTES OF 4TH ANNUAL REUNION

"Rohrerstown, Pa., July 29, 1909
"On this date the Overholser
Reunion was held at the ususal
place, the delightful grove on the
farm of Mr. S.O. Frantz near Rohrerstown, Lancaster County, Pa.

"For some reason, the number in attendance was smaller than the previous year, but the occasion proved highly enjoyable to those so fortunate as to be present. Not the least enjoyable feature of the occasion was the bountiful dinner spread under the trees.

"In the afternoon some time was occupied with musical and literary exercises, and a business meeting was held.

"Rev. S.H. Chubb of Bangor, Pa., led in the opening prayer. The President of the Reunion Association, Martin L. Overholser of Millersville, made the opening address. He referred feelingly to the death of Martin Overholser of Pequa Valley who had been present at previous reunions. He also gave interesting items from the will of Martin Overholser, the progenitor of all the Overholsers present this day.

BEATRICE BAYLEY'S BOOK

Beatrice Bayley of Sterling, Pa., has published a book entitled, The Family Heritage Book; your Association has purchased a copy for \$19.85.

The notice of availability of the book went out in Nov. 1979, and the order was to be placed not later than Dec. 19, 1979. The Association's copy was received by your president in March 1980.

The book includes, aside from the text, several forms for recording one's ancestors, several personal history sheets, several family chart forms, the Overholser directory, and pictures relating

to early U.S. history.

The text of the book comprises the following chapters: How to Search for Family Ancestors, History of Ethnic Origins and Activities, The Meaning and Origin of Heraldry, the Origins of Names and their Meaning, and The Reference Books. These chapters cover about 50 pages (unnumbered) and include quite a number of pictures relating to early U.S. history.

The Directory at the end of the book lists 309 male OVERHOLSERS arranged by state and by zip code within the state. Of the 20 on our mailing list, 7 are not included in the book. Only 5 are listed from Pennsylvania. Winfred is listed in Washington, D.C.; he died in 1964. His son, Winfred, Jr., is not included. Elwood, Winfred's brother, is listed in Mass.; he died in 1971.

For someone who has NOT done genealogical research, this book might be of some use. The book was advertised by Beatrice Bayley as the "Overholser Family Heritage Book," but the only part which relates to the Overholsers is the directory of 309 names and addresses at the end of the book.

RESEARCH UPDATED

Earlier research was reported by me at the Overholser family reunion in August 1978 and was published in summary in the Overholser Bulletin, Feb. 1979. An appeal for assistance was made in Mr. Brossman's column in the May 24, 1979, issue of the Lebanon Daily News.

Marcus Oberholtzer is an important immigrant whose children's descendants are important branches of the family. He was established on his farm in Coventry Township, Chester County, Pennsylvania, before 1714 and perhaps by 1711 as indicated by the will of Thomas Fairman. His farm was located on the topographic map by fitting the colonial survey of his 300 acres and 100 acres of his son Marcus' farm (adjacent) on the same scale. It is located on the outskirts of Kenilworth, across the river from Pottstown. Samuel, his 4th son, also had a survey of his land, adjacent to Jacob Enger, one of the founders of the Mennonite Church in Coventry in 1753. The later church of 1798 was built on land originally owned by Marcus. His eldest son, Jacob, married Barbara — and was administrator of his father's estate. A Jacob Oberholtzer and Jacob Wissimore (Wismer) paid quit rents in 1750 for 23 years which indicated that they went to Bucks County in 1727, the year after Marcus' death. Overholtzers are buried in the cemetery of the 1798 church, but the records of the Franconia Conference state that the earliest settlers were buried in the Sproegel cemetery of Pottstown, across the river from Marcus' farm. stones from this graveyard were taken to the Mennonite Church on Hanover Street. Several people are researching the descendants of Jacob Ober-

holtzer who arrived in 1732 on the ship "Samuel" with two children, Elizabeth (6) and Samuel (3). Mrs. Gnau, Cooperstown, Pa., sent a summary of records located by her uncle. His son, William Henry Overholt, of Newtown Square, has offered to answer questions from the records of his father's research. Mrs. Wayne (Helen Overholser) Turn of San Angelo, Texas, has records of the descendants of Jacob's son, Samuel, who married Maria Eva Hausswirth in 1765 and went to Shenandoah County, Virginia, and died there in 1783. His son, Peter, stayed in Virginia, but his son, Samuel, went to Tennessee. The elder (immigrant) Jacob married a second time to Susanna Scheuler. Their children were: 1) Barbara m. Christian Bretz, 2) Jacob m. Esther Blehm, 3) Esther, 4) Henry m. Catherine Shumaker. This line lived in Berks County, and many were associated with the Mennonite church in Bally, Pa.

A clue to Martin Oberholtzer, who signed the letter of thanks to the Dutch before the "Mary Hope" sailed from London to Philadelphia in 1710 and the warrant of October for 10,000 A. in (now) Lancaster County, was supplied by Mr. David P. Hively, Felton, Pa. He found that a Martin Overhulser died intestate in 1749 in York County (which was formed from Lancaster County that year). His inventory indicated that he was elderly, living on a small farm and was a carpenter. He had six books, two notes and three bonds listed as assets. No descendants were listed.

An Oberholtzer was a teamster for General Braddock in 1755.

Thanks to all who wrote and initiated contacts.

The pamphlet (title page reproduced below) which included the history of The Oberholtzer Family, prepared by Charles E. Overholser and read at the first reunion on July 26, 1906, has several errors therein. During research conducted by your editor for an article entitled "The Terre Hill Oberholtzer Family" in the April 1978 issue of the Pennsylvania Mennonite Heritage, the errors listed below were noted.

Many of you on our mailing list have this pamphlet, since dozens of them were distributed in recent years. These copies were donated by Spencer Tinker of Honolulu, Hawaii, a great-great grandson of IIIMartin.

On page 2, lines 18-19, it is stated, "It is very likely that our progenitor was Jacob Oberholtzer who came over in the ship, 'Samuel'...", and on page 3, lines 12-14, it is stated, "... it is more likely that we are descended from Jacob of 1732 than from any other Overholtzer whose name is recorded." In fact we are descended from Samuel who arrived on the ship Molly in Philadelphia on September 30, 1727.

On page 2, lines 23-25, it is stated, "It is clear that the Oberholtzer from whom we are descended did not live in Lancaster County before about 1800." Lancaster County Court House records show that land was purchased by immigrant Samuel in Lancaster County in 1746, most of which went to his son, IIMartin.

On page 3, lines 15-17, it is stated, "However, we are sure of our descent as far back as Christian. His son, Martin, was born in 1764." The Lancaster County Court House records show that Martin's (b. 1764) father was IIMartin, not Christian.

"Conestoga Valley Park, Lanc. Co., Pa. July 28, 1910.

"The fifth Annual Reunion of the Overholser Freundschaft held on the above date on the banks of the historic Conestoga was probably the most successful so far. The attendance was more than twice as large as the previous year and slightly larger than any previous occasion.

"A printed program had been sent out previous to the Reunion on a folder containing invitation etc. This program was followed almost to the letter. It included an address by the president, Mr. Martin L. Overholser, and brief addresses by Mr. M.L. Overholser, Mrs. Sallie Buch, Dan'l Overholser of Reading, Mr. Isaac Stirk of Lancaster, Mr. W.H.H. Kinzer of Lancaster, on the subject, 'Daniel Overholser as I knew him.'

"The music included three gospel hymns by all assembled, vocal solos by Rev. J.S. Overholser of Phila., Miss Gertrude Frantz of Rohrerstown, Mr. Reuben Overholser of Belleview, Allegheny County, a piano solo by Miss Mabel Woodring of Myerstown, Pa., and a piano duet by Miss Anna Overholser and Miss Edna Hurst.

"A business session followed at which the following business was transacted.

"The former officers were reelected. The time of meeting was changed to the first week in August.

"Miss Anna M. Overholser was elected Musical Director.

"Agreed that a committee on necrology be appointed by the chair and also agreed that a historian be appointed by the chair. On motion, the committee of arrangements was continued.

"The treasurer Mr. Weiler reported a margin of cash left over expenditures.

"After singing 'Blest Be the Tie that Binds' adjournment followed.

The January 31, 1980, issue of the Reading Eagle includes an article about Iona Oberholtzer who started going blind from ulcers on the pupil of each eye about 10 years ago. On the recommendation of her doctor, she has been crocheting to occupy her time. then, she has completed 136 bedspreads, 100 afghans with matching pillows, 50 baby wraps, 12 ponchos, and at least 50 throw pillows. Iona and her husband, Joseph, attended the reunion last August at Terre Hill. Joseph is a descendant of IVSamuel, son of IIISamuel.

Mrs. Winfred Overholser of Sacramento, Calif., (Dr. Winfred O. was president of our association 1939-56) has stated that she, her daughter, Jane, and husband, also of Sacramento, will attend the reunion this year. Inasmuch as Dorothy is 85 years old, it is quite a tribute to her that she would make the effort to travel such a long distance to attend another reunion.

Rosy Oberholser of Oberholz, Switzerland, says that she would like to attend an Overholser reunion, but that August is not a good month for her to leave her restaurant. Some of you met her when she was here with her daughter, Johanna, in the spring of 1978. Rosy says that she would like to visit the United States again soon. It is tradition that the ancestors of immigrant Samuel O. (1727) came from this village of Oberholz.

After reading the "Minutes of the 3rd Annual Reunion" in the August 1979 issue of the Bulletin, Miss Sarah Ann Stauffer writes: "The S.O. Frantz who entertained the Reunion July 1908 was our grandfather, and the place is where the whole intimate family now lives, Lime Spring Farm. Nine generations of our family have lived here, ever since they settled in the country from the Palatinate."
