
2009 REUNION

J Spencer Overholser 92, died April 16, 2009 wife of Ruth Schell. He was the son of the late James Galt Overholser and Clara Minerva Groff. He graduated from Jamestown College in ND, and served in WWII in Normandy, The Battle of the Bulge, and helped liberate the Flossenburg Concentration Camp. Spence became a food chemist, later working as a U S Patent examiner in Washington DC. He was OFA President from 1956 to 1986, the fifth and longest running President to hold together our Association.

Spence is survived by Christopher J & wife Sara Jo of Richmond VA and their children Robert & Terry Anne; Josephine & husband Ole Helleskov of CA.

Spencer Overholser - A Life of Commitment

When I first started coming to OFA Reunions back in the early 1990's, I was greeted by a jovial elderly man that I hadn't a clue who he was. Turns out Spencer is a cousin through the SL Samuel 1727 Line. Instantly Spencer took up an interest in me. That is a rare thing nowadays. It is not unusual to want to know what a person does for a living, or where they live. But rarely does one want to know about the person them self. This is an extremely sad commentary on America, but the truth is it is now pretty much a reality.

Spencer was President of the OFA for 30 years, the longest anyone has served. He kept it going through the many years of prosperity in America, when everyone else was busy with making hay. Even while there was no solid evidence of a heritage that returned to the Old World, Spencer kept the faith that someday we could find the missing clues to link our family to definite European heritage. This is important to many of us, as it gives a sense of belonging to something bigger than us, a goal of preserving not only a past, but also a goal to preserve a future for our children which gives wholeness to one's life. As a Chinese proverb so brilliantly states, *To forget one's ancestors is to be as a stream without a source, or a tree without roots.* Spencer understood this as well as anyone.

Deep down inside, everyone has a need to belong to something bigger than themselves. Aquiring a rooted heritage helps us get beyond our useless give-up attitudes, and brings us to a realization that others needs come first. And when we help fill others needs, ours somehow by the help of God get met with barely a notice.

UPDATE ON FUTURE EVENTS

The **2009 300th Anniversary** of German Settlements in Lancaster County PA Bus Trips are being planned by the Lancaster Mennonite Historical Society! Cost is @ \$65 per person. **September 26** is confirmed, the first trip occurred on June 15th . Please register early if you plan to go, for they will fill up fast. I understand the trip will take in the land along the East side of the Susquehanna River where several Indian villages were during 1710. They will end at the Hans Herr House, a stone house built in the first settlement of Swiss Mennonites. The Hans Herr House is having a special event on August 1st. You may want to work that into your weekend plans.

The 2010 events are still being planned. LMHS also will have a "Heritage Trail" walk, bike, or ride a Conestoga Wagon along the Indian path into Lancaster County. Mark your calenders for August 28-29, 2010, and check up for additional information.

At the **August 1st Reunion 2009**, we will decide on whether or not to make a one year change of place, going to the original homestead lands where the Hans Herr House resides, the oldest documented extant home in Lancaster County. This would be **only for the year 2010**, to celebrate 300 years since the first Oberholtzer families came to Lancaster County. They were the Matthew Oberholtzer family, and ML Martin Michel Oberholtzer, as documented in Lancaster and Bucks County historical books.

Begin planning a trip in **2011 to the Overholtzer Mansion in Oklahoma City, OK**. Details of a *Special* North American O Reunion will be forthcoming in next years OFA Bulletins.

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CEMETARY INSIGHTS

At **Good's Mennonite Church and Cemetery** in Elizabethtown, PA, are two wives of Christian Oberholtzer. But where is Christian?

What is interesting about this is not just that two wives are buried beside each other without the husband. This is the father of our beloved "original genealogist" Isaiah E Oberholtzer, the missionary to China. The dates on these two stones both differ from the OFA File Records. Also, the middle initial of both ladies are missing from our records. Any descendant of this family, who may be tracing their ancestors, would have run into a roadblock without the female Middle Initial. This is major evidence why it is important to visit and maintain our ancestral cemeteries.

Irish Emigration by some O Families

JA, JC, JT, MV, & Melchior Oberhaus

Some Oberholzer families during the 17th Century were eager to come to America, but did not have a way to produce enough capital for the trip. Some of these families had enough fare to travel from mainland Europe to England. After arrival, most of the refugees were grouped together in the same area of London. After the volume of people grew too large for London to handle, the poorest of those (the ones who could not afford passage to America) were transferred to Ireland, where they could at least meek out a survival subsistence for themselves.

In the years from the later 1600's to the later 1700's, the refugee parents of families died off, and the children continued on, trying their best to save enough funds to carry them to America. It was either the children or the grandchildren of the emigrants from the mainland who managed to find passage to the North American coast.

The cost of passage to America is documented by Alberty Dooren of a merchant ship from Rotterdam dated August 12th of 1709. "Passage to America was a two month trip from Rotterdam. It had a fare of 100 florins for everyone. There were no accounts for children, including food. Land and livestock in America would cost an additional 30 to 100 florins. Passengers must be able to pay; there will be no subsistence from anyone. The Queen of England knows nothing about German language and will refuse refugees; no more will be admitted from Rotterdam."

"When Mittleberger sailed the fare from Rotterdam to Phila was 10 pounds for anyone 10 years old or over. Five to ten year olds traveled for 5 Lbs and those under 5 sailed free, and good luck to them. By the mid-nineteenth century the fare from Ireland to the United States was about 3 pounds 5 shillings, still almost half the annual income of the average farmer."

David Weaver is closely tied to colonial newspaperman Christopher Sauer, an influential Pennsylvanian, who wrote of the treacherous trips across the Atlantic this haunting conclusion: [referring to "pirates on the sea, lifeboats used as stables and rotted by manure," and the "unfortunate passengers of the *Mexico* who froze to death off New York harbor on New Year's Day 1837 because there was no pilot on duty to guide them in."] "After all there is no use dwelling on such details: they were undoubtedly to a greater or lesser extent, the necessary accompaniments of a great unsupervised movement of emigration."

There is a premise from language arts and history that reveal the path of emigration for John Overholser. Genealogists in the past several years have shown the surname of Oberholzer & its variants to have originated all from the Oberholzer Farm east of Zürich Lake in Switzerland. From there, the younger family moved to the spring called Aa, and spread into what is now Wald. When John's ancestors were forced to flee Switzerland, they would have moved somewhere between Alsace and Belgium.

It is quite likely that some of the Oberholzer descendants, which have not been documented, were part of the earliest group who traveled in 1709 to England, hoping to find passage to America. It is now understood that the poorest of the group of immigrants in England were sent to Ireland. There they stayed for several years, due to lack of funds for travel to America.

JA John Overholser

"John Overholser went to Juniata Co" after arrival from Europe. -Ship Passenger Lists, pg 290 There is a clue as to from where John immigrated. His daughter has a proper name of Sarah. This is the German name. But in some documents she is referred to as "Sallie". This is an Irish name. How appropriate for a family who through poverty was forced to live in a country not their own for several years, until the children could scrape up enough funds to find their way to America.

JA John Overholser c1740 - dp 3/11/1809 Reading Twp Adams Co

"John Overholster, one of 150 teamsters (wagon haulers) recruited at Lancaster by Benjamin Franklin to be a wagoner for General Braddock on 4/30/1755 in the campaign against Fort DuQuesne. John of Adams Co was the only John I can find in that area at that time."

MV Marcus Oberholtzer b c1760 was first found on the 1787 tax list in Rockingham Co VA. It has been suggested that he had a 1st marriage with a son Martin b c 1782-no further information.

This family is shown to have definite connections to Ireland. HO Henry married a Sarah, which also uses Sally in her referenced documents. The wife of grandson George W Overholt accidentally mixed the generations, but properly noted the original birth of the father (Marcus) to have been in Ireland.

JC Jacob of Northampton Co PA, & Columbiana Co OH

Jacob was a Mennonite Minister, whose wife is said to have been born in Ireland. There are no outstanding Irish names in this family, leading one to believe Jacob was not in Ireland, or spent very little time there.

JC4 Ursula Overholzer was on the 1780 PA Tax List Index for US Twp, Philadelphia. This implies that Ursula is older than JC1 Rev Jacob Oberholtzer.

JC1 Rev Jacob named his 16th child Melchior Oberholtzer, and his grandson is also Melchior. This is a rare use of this name in early American Oberholtzer families. This could lead to the possibility that Jacob was closely related to Melchior Oberhans, immigrant from Ireland.

CA Christian Overholser SR Of Reading Township, Adams Co, Pennsylvania

Christian Overholser Sr is a possible brother to JA John Overholser

Lived in Adams Co, bur Zimmerman Cem, Liberty Twp near the Maryland Line. Court records name children but not his wife. Samuel Overholser (JA6) was appointed guardian of the children.

One additional comment has to do with settlement of the families in Pennsylvania. JA John Overholser and CA Christian Overholser families settled in Adams Co, PA, west of the Susquehanna River. In William Penn's original placement of immigrants, German Immigrants were placed in Lancaster county, surrounded by Irish Immigrants to the south and west. This is another indication of possible emigration from Ireland. MV Marcus Oberholtzer traveled through the western side of the Susquehanna River on his way to Virginia.

Tory John Overholt named his daughter Sally. This is most unusual for a German Family. If John came from Ireland, this may be an indication to his allegiance switch during the Revolutionary War. This further emphasizes the notion that Tory John was a Mainland European to England to Ireland to America immigrant.

It is unknown who Isaac's first wife was, or from where she came. The immediate family of Abraham Renner had no Sarah or Sally, so it can be presumed that they did not have any long-term Irish connections. Sarah only shows up on this one entry of the Overholt family, and there is no known "Sally" references to her. But Abraham Renner's mother was a Harman, and that family is closely connected to the Ogden family from England.

There are no Sarah or Sally connections to **SL Samuel Oberholtzer** 1727 Immigrant.

There are no Sarah or Sally connections to **CH Christian Oberholtzer** of Lancaster County.

Grace Milligan's Christian A Overholtzer, JL4

Christian A Overholtzer married Christina Musselman, granddaughter of Hans & Margaret Musselman, who immigrated and built on Mill Creek, a tributary to the Conestoga. Hans, Margaret, and son Christian are buried at Groffdale Cemetery, Earl Twp Lancaster County PA. Christina, b May 30, 1759 married between 1792 and 1797 in SW Adams County, PA.

The JL Overholtzer family is certain to have come from mainland Europe, and not to have gone to Ireland.

It is highly possible some O families were part of these immigrant groups:

1710 June 14th Colonel Robert Hunter, appointed Governor of New York... brought with him 2000 Palatines who in the previous year had fled to England from the rage of persecution in Germany. Many of whom settled in New York; others in Germantown, Livingston Manor, Columbia county, and others in Penn's Woods.

1710 Fall the 3000 Palatines encamped at New York were moved to Livingston District.

About the year 1723, 33 families of Germans, lately from **Schoharie**, **New York**, settled on the Swatara and Tulpehocken Creeks by permission of Governor Keith. Some were Jorge Ritt (George Rutt), Io. Hameler Ritt,

1729 267 English & Welsh passengers and servants; 43 Scotch servants, 1155 passengers and servants from Ireland; and 4500 by way of New Castle, chiefly passengers & servants from Ireland.

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What is "Proof"

In the last issue of the Bulletin, I connected the SL Samuel Oberholtzer line to Hans Jagli Oberholtzer b c1665 - lived at Steinsfurt, Germany. I only had one argumentative comment (I mean that in a good way), that I did not have "proof" for the just mentioned connection. I do not want the enigma of "proof" to continue without a comprehensive view of what constitutes proof in the rhealm of genealogy. I have spent considerable time (literally thousands of hours) studying Biblical chronology, as well as genealogical chronology; therefore I feel I have a fair handle on the problem. But let's see if that means anything.

The Biblical Greek definition of "proof" actually uses four different words:

1) pistis Faith, faithfulness Used in Acts 17:31

This word obviously is not based on scientific evidence. And yet it is a form of proof.

2) *endeixis* A pointing out or indication

Used in II Corinthians 8:24

This word is based on a single aspect of evidence. It is a singular aspect of a proof. Though there are more than one aspect to it, this word reveals a proof; but taken out of context it can be made untrue.

3) dokime The process or result of testing Used in II Corinthians 9:13; 13:3; I Peter 1:7

This is our "scientific" way of testing. In genealogy it is "linguistic science" we must deal with for the most part. DNA now also becomes part of the process. And there are other ways of "testing".

4) *tekmerion* Convincing proofs (plural)

Used in Acts 1:3

This is the kind of "PROOF" that everyone **hopes** to achieve!

The purpose of showing this, is that even in the whole Holy Bible, which is the inspired words of the Creator himself through the power of the Holy Spirit, only one passage speaks of "convincing proofs". The journey of genealogy is a long, arduous task of gathering information. But without the gathering, without the cross-checking, without the testing, one really cannot be sure. Or can they?

When you speak to a friend about your grandparents, or even your great-grandparents, do you "prove" to them that they are who you say? Of course not! And your friend BELIEVES you, because he has *pistis* in what you have said. No more further proof is needed.

But what if you are discussing your 10th generation backward? Will your friend still take what you say as "gospel". Possibly not. Here you will need an *endeixis* of some kind.

And if that friend is a genealogy buff also, he or she most likely will not accept just a point of consideration. More *dokime* is necessary to convince them that you have found real "proof", real evidence of what you say is true. This is a hard thing, because first of all you may feel your reputation for being truthful is being attacked. And secondly, unless you have massive experience on your side, you may not have the answer that person is searching for.

So how can we find "Proof" where there may not seem to be? And what if your Proof is not real Proof after all?

For instance, when I was working on the HV/HO Line, the death certificate of George W Overholt, grandson of MV Marcus Overholt, said his father came from Ireland. Here is a LEGAL DOCUMENT that was wrong! Marcus came from Ireland, but his son, the father of George, was born here in the States.

POINT OF INDICATION: By looking at all the other information about the family, it is easily discernible that the wife of George W Overholt had heard George talking years before of Ireland. She evidently got that memory mixed, and said George had come from Ireland. A simple mental error, on a legal document, can make for lots of argumentation if it is not found by compiling additional evidence and cross-checking for discrepancies.

New OFA Website a Surprise Success

It was not what we were expecting. We were asked if we could locate a living female Overholser from Memphis, Tennessee. Read on:

I am looking for a "Sue" Overholser. We were friends years ago in the early 50's...we lived in Memphis, TN in some apartments on Highland Avenue at Poplar Avenue. If I remember correctly, she and her family moved to Oklahoma, which is where her great-grandfather ended up in a covered wagon. Unfortunately, I can't remember much more about her family than that... oh yes, we went to East High School. I know her father worked for a car dealership in Memphis but that is all I know. I realize this is a tall order and I am looking for a miracle...but any help would be appreciated... I just don't know how to go about finding out what happened to her. Thank you for any help you can dig up. Sincerely, Patti Mitchell UNOUOTE

Using the few facts provided, a search of the Internet yielded the following data from a high school website: QUOTE East High School Class of 1963:

Barbara Overholser [last updated September, 2004] I am married now for 39 years to Joe Tiscia, a CBHS graduate and we have two daughters, ages 25 and 23. We met at Memphis State. Thanks to Mrs. Vollmer I was skilled at typing and shorthand (a dying art!) and went with an insurance company. My husband was a Marine in Vietnam and was awarded the Silver Star. I am very proud of him. He is active in Marine Corp league and TN State Guard. I only work part time now and enjoy gardening and reading and taking care of our family. Both our girls are single and live with us. UNQUOTE

This result was sent to Patti and she replied with the following:

QUOTE Wow amazing... I graduated in 1960 from East.. .my brother graduated from CBC.. as it was called then. My hubby was stationed at the Marine Corps Induction Station at Kennedy Hospital when we met...43 yrs ago. He took an early out for college in 1960 and was discharged shortly after we married... our youngest son was also in the Marine Corps...as was my Dad in WWI. Small world isn't it.

Thanks for your help. I sure would love to find Sue.. but I feel it is hopeless... after so many years. Patti UNQUOTE

Patti sent an email to Barbara which subsequently resulted in Patti sending back the following words: QUOTE Dear Mr. Shinpaugh:

This is to thank you so very much for the information regarding Barbara Overholser. She, in fact, turned out to be Sue's sister, whom I did not remember even existed. I received an email from Barbara today informing me that she had forwarded my email to Sue. I simply cannot tell you how long I have searched for something regarding Sue... thanks to you and the Overholser web-site, I have finally found out something about her. It truly made my day.
