

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CEMETARY INSIGHTS

GANTZ MENNONITE CEMETERY - An archaeologists rebuttal

On the west side of Manheim, Lancaster County, along Colebrook Road, is an old church on the east side of the road, and Gantz Cemetery on the west side. The Gantz Mennonite Church has long since dissolved, and a modern more charismatic church is in its place.

What stunned me was the fact that the cemetery had not placed a new grave in over one hundred years! Since I do a tremendous amount of studying in Biblical archaeology, my mind immediately brought up some squabbles by modern archaeologists who claim that since no evidence is found at a Biblical site during a hundred year period, no one lived in the vicinity. This graveyard is solid proof that archaeologists are wrong in their assumptions. People have lived in the area, they just chose not to bury their dead in this particular cemetery.

In looking at the peoples names, the back row of stones stood high. Made of sandstone, they included a sun shaped center top, inscribed with an eight-pointed star. It is very rare to find an eight-pointed star in a Lancaster County cemetery. And there were four of them in this yard. All members of the Ganbir family. I searched to find the meaning of the eight point star. The early Christian writer Ignatius from Antioch called the star "the mysterious human-genesis of Christ himself." How appropriate for an Anabaptist to carry the star into the New World, as a sign of a new life in Christ.

MILTON GROVE CEMETERY

The **Milton Grove Cemetery** is a very old one. It has an iron fence with an elaborate iron double swinging gate. Blacktop driveways go in different directions, both leading to a circle with a large tree in the middle. Another lane comes in from the bottom of the graveyard, bending around to meet at the circle. It is obvious from the present design, the cemetery has been added onto in a rather unplanned way, and at more than one time. The original cemetery sat on the back slope, beyond the circle.

What troubles me with this cemetery is what has been done to seven rows of old stone markers. They have been laid flat into the surface of the ground so they could be mowed over. But in the past few short years, grass has covered many of the stones. This will allow water to enter the surface of the stones, freeze during winter, and break up the facing of the stone until it becomes illegible. This is not a valid form of preservation.

JUMPING JOVIAL JACOB!

If there is confusion in the genealogical family, it is often found in the repetition of names. In trying to connect the Immigrants with the known families, I have found there are many Jacob Oberholzers from the 1700's.

I first wish to begin looking at the JB Jacob Oberholtzer family. When Helen Turn was finishing up her book *Samuel Overholtzer of Virginia*, she included some information (in red) which she had gathered and appeared to go together as an earlier generation of JB Jacob of Coolbrookdale.

"Born 1704 in Switzerland, emmigrated to Phila PA 1732 on Samuel." This is incorrect. This reference is now proved to be immigrant JL Jacob Oberholtzer of Brecknock Township.

"Paid quit rent on 150 acres in Franconia Twp by 1734." This also is wrong, as this is the JF Jacob Oberholtzer of Franconia family.

"1st wife unknown. Did not come to America, the following two children came with father: Elizabeth 1726 - , & Samuel 1729 m Eva Elisabeth." These are the children of JL Jacob Oberholtzer of Brecknock Township.

The grouped document also lists the assumed mother and children of the said father of JB Jacob Oberholtzer of Coolbrookdale. The middle initial "S" was likely added by Helen, for no confirmation of such can be found. Susanna Schueler was documented as JBsr's wife as early as 1917 in the Funk Genealogy.

2nd wife Susanna Schueler's children:

Barbara S Oberholtzer 1737-1803 m Christian Bretz [Fretz]

Barbara Ford has confirmed this to be BB Barbara Fretz, the surname starting with a "B" is either a misprint or a language variation.

Jacob S Oberholtzer 1741-1811 m Esther Bleam

This Jacob has proved to be JB Jacob Oberholtzer of Coolbrookdale

Esther S Oberholtzer 1743-1816 single

Noted below with circumstantial evidence as a sister of JB Jacob

Henry S Oberholtzer 1745-1783 m Catherine Shoemaker 1746-1823

Here again the "S" cannot be substantiated, and this is now proved to be JF14 Henry.

It is likely that JB Jacob 1741-1811 and Esther Oberholtzer 1743 - 1816 single are siblings. Their birth dates are only two years apart. Both are buried at Bally Cem. And Jacob has a daughter named Esther, who also happened to remain single. The Pennsylvania Traveler Vol XII gives cemetery records for Bally (now Hereford Cemetery)

Helen Turn used the information provided by JB6 Abraham B Oberholtzer that stated a Henry Oberholtzer was a son of this JBsr Jacob Oberholtzer Sr. But the Henry which Helen is referring to in her book is JF14 Henry Oberholtzer. This is wrong information repeated in another document. This is how later geneaologists get to the point of saying they just cannot find the truth. In saying this, I must admit that I cannot find any legal proof of this family. It stands only on the fact that after the bulk of the 18th Century O families have been correctly compiled, the following fits together by place and time circumstantial evidence.

One of the early documents in Grace Milligan's book, *Christian Oberholtzer and Father Jacob* was a letter written to Rev Isaiah Oberholtzer (wrongly given as Isaac). It stated the belief that the father of JL4 Christian Oberholtzer had come over on a ship with the Mussleman family, whose daughter married JL4 Christian. This is true. It also stated JL4 had a brother Jacob who left home and was never heard from again. Barbara Ford believed this Jacob to be JL8, who is found on the 1785 Census of Dauphin Co PA. Therefore, JB Jacob of Berks Co could not be a descendant of JL Jacob Oberholtzer of Brecknock Twp.

Page 312 of Turn's book states that Jacob came to America in 1737 and married Susanna Scheuler. The evidence for Susanna is from the Funk Genealogy. There is evidence that a Jacob Oberholtzer (Sr of JB) came to America, but when is unknown to date of this writing. It is a strong possibility there was a daughter Barbara who later married Christian Fretz.

JB Jacob Oberholtzer was first found on the Frankford/New Hanover Twp, Phila Co (now Montgy Co) tax list 1769 with no acres. It was not until 1774 that Jacob Overholtz of Hanover Twp bought 190 acres in Berks Co from Joseph Fox.

JBsr Jacob Oberholtzer b c1710 - c 100 years old Berks Co PA, unlisted grave

Son JB Jacob built a limestone house 1801 on the original 200 acre homestead bought from the Quakers. On the JB farm, on the opposite side of the railroad tracks, stands a log house, one story high. [JB6] Abraham B Oberholtzer wrote "it was so low that a big man could bump his head against the joists. It had a big fire corner. They had no stoves. No cellar. [The log house was] 25 by 40 feet square. It was built right in the middle of the woods. I remember my father and I visited [JB8] Martin Oberholtzer and Betty there - in that house - probably 60 years ago." - Your father, Milton G Oberholtzer, Quakertown PA, Jan 15, 1917

The birth dates for the two do not substantiate this claim.

JC JACOB OBERHOLTZER

JC Jacob Oberholtzer b likely in the 40's Germany - aft 1784 Bedminster Co PA no land, 7 in family m Irish woman b? - res Bucks Co mid 1700's - prob aft 1784

A Mennonite minister, according to family tradition, is said to have immigrated in 1760, whose wife is said to have been born in Ireland, came to Bucks Co PA in the mid 1700's. On the 1784 tax in Bedminster Co Jacob Oberholtzer has 7 in his family with no acres which would tie into the children he is said to have had. He is said to have married a woman named Katherine, but there may have been a mix-up in the generations, for his son's wife is also named Catherine. It is unlikely this Jacob came from Ireland, since both he and the family retain the Anglicized version of the Oberholzer name.

He lived in Upper Saucon Twp, Northampton Co (now Lehigh) where he purchased 199 acres from his father-in-law, George Bachman 5/8/1794. He is said to have been a minister in the Saucon Mennonite Church and on 10/6/1804 sold his land for 1850 LB; between then and 1806 moved to Columbiana Co OH where it is said he became the first ordained Mennonite minister in Ohio. On 5/9/1807 he purchased Section 29 Beaver Twp from Thomas Farquhar for \$1923. He organized a Mennonite congregation in Beaver Twp in 1815 and in 1825 a log meetinghouse called Oberholtzers was built on Jacob's farm. Because of his disappointment at the congregation's rejection of continuance of the meetinghouse school, he moved to Ashland Co Ohio where he was a minister at Brubakers Mennonite. Tradition says he was a bishop. In the 1870 census his son Isaac said that he was not foreign born.

DEFINITIONS OF OUR O FAMILY NAMES PART ONE

Oberholtzer, Overholser, Overholt, Oberholzer, Oberholser, Uberholtzer, etc, etc. You get the picture. Several members of our family have been asking "How did we get all those spellings?" Well, I will attempt to answer this the best I can. Some of the most used spellings have clear reasons for the differences. And some can be classified as simple abberations. But even an abberation has clear reasons for it, so I will kiss and tell what I know (I am writing this on Valentine's Day).

Our family heritage began in the hills southeast of Zurich Lake in the Alps of Switzerland. Hundreds of years before the town of Wald, which lay in the valley below, an Alemanni tribal family migrated to the top of the treeline and built a homestead. They did so in order to plant fast growing crops like oats where they could get enough sunlight for the very short planting season. By the end of the First Millenium A.D., the family began a furniture company, eventually selling church furniture throughout Europe. I surmise that when people would come looking for this furniture maker, neighbors would be asked where they lived. The locals would say "In the *hof obern holz*." all in German of course.

Ober meant over or above. The word holz is High German, and originally meant a grove of trees.* So evidently, while there are still woodlands on top of the hillsides east and west of the valley, there were only a grove of trees between the Oberholzer Hof (farm) and the lower part of the valley where the town of Wald is today. Over the centuries the word holz came to mean wood in general (timber, lumber, firewood, piece of wood)^. These period dictionary references imply that the grove of trees down the valley from the Hof was used for the making of the furniture, as well as building logs, and firewood for cooking and heating.

The suffix *er* was added to oberholz to mean "the one who is". So the original name in Switzerland meant "the one who is over or above the grove of trees", i.e. *Oberholzer*. Over the years descendants have shortened the definition to say "above the woods."**

The town name of Wald means "woods", but today the town is not in a woods.

Pronunciation has a bit to do with some of the spelling variations. The most common *Oberholzer* makes use of the German O just as the English pronounce it as "oh". Some of the family make use of the spelling Uberholtzer, where the pronounciation is "oo" short as in foot (rather than the English "u"). This latter usage is from the German alphabet, whereas the former more common usage today is derived from the Roman alphabet.^^ *Uber* is used in both the dative form and the accusative form. As Anabaptists, some of their foes certainly used the accusative form when condemning the *Uberholzer*.

When the family went through the divisional strife of the Reformation Era, several Oberholzer families were forced to move. Some went to Alsace, France; others into the Palatinate along the Rhine River valley. The 30 years war had left this land desolate from burning out and killing the resident families. The remaining local authorities invited the Anabaptist refugees to stay and rebuild the farms.

While these Oberholzer families retained the spelling of the Swiss High German language, Palatinate records of the 17th century became both obsolete and difficult to find. Some of these Oberholzer families decided to take the risk of emigrating to America (and one to South Africa), in hopes of a more stable food supply, and a fresh start without religious strife.

Most of these O immigrants could not write, and relied on the English ship captains to record their names, while they would make their mark alongside the spelling. The Middle English word for *holz* included the letter "t", as holtz. This is how the Oberholtzer spelling came into being. It is an Anglicized version of the German *Oberholzer*.

When later writers from America in the 20th century sought out the Oberholzer families in Europe, they wrote the surname in the Anglicized version of Oberholtzer. This is why so many Europeon documents in Barbara Ford's files predominantly use the English form of our name.

IRISH INFLUENCES

William Penn was a Christian who belonged to the Quaker Church in England. When he obtained the rights to Penn's Woods, he gathered a continguency of Welsh, Irish and Scottish businessmen and preachers to form his newfound colonial government. Edward Jones was the leader of the group who settled the 40,000 acre Welsh Tract on the west side of the Schuylkill River from Philadelphia. James Logan was a young entrepreneur who would become Secretary of the Interior. John Jones was the largest land investor of the group. With these forerunners came others who would keep ship logs, copy surveys and warrants, record Naturalization papers, etc.

These Scots, Irish, and Welsh used a slightly different dialect than the English from the London area. Instead of Ober they would say *Over*. And instead of saying holtz or holz, they would pronounce it as *holse*.

At least one of the Oberholzer families were shifted to Ireland prior to immigrating to America. The children of that family took on the Overholser spelling before ever reaching this continent a generation or two later. Other Oberholtzer families would be in America for a while before having an Irish documentor instill the Overholser spelling onto a will, deed etc..

In Part Two of this discussion I will look into some of the rest of the spellings, which have more localized changes to our family name of Oberholz.

Henry Overholser JA430 Apr 14, 1846 - Aug 25, 1915 OK

Henry Overholser was born in OH. At an early age of 16, Henry learned how to be successful at business in mercantile and real estate in Ohio, and became wealthy through transactions in Indiana, Wisconsin, and Colorado, before settling down in the newly formed Oklahoma Territory. Henry was a get things done kind of guy. Arriving just a few days after the Land Run of April 1889, cargo loads of lumber from Michigan had already arrived by train, ready to set up business buildings on lots he bought on Grand Avenue (present-day Sheridan Ave). Within a month he was elected president of the newly formed Board of Trade, later known as the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce. His private life happened just as fast, and in October of the same year he married his second wife Anna Ione Murphy. In just six months Henry had built a completely new life in a barren land. But his own mansion would have to wait until 1904.

Henry went on a tour of Europe in 1911, and while there suffered a stroke. He never recovered from it, lingering as an invalid until his death. As one of the founding fathers of Oklahoma City, he was the engineering hub of the pioneer town, and now its a major city.

Henry came to Oklahoma April 22, 1889, at the time of the opening of the OK Territory. He built the Grand Avenue Hotel in 1889 and the Overholser Opera House in 1890. His most notable accomplishment was in 1897 when he induced the Frisco Railroad to extend their line from Tulsa through Oklahoma City. In 1904 he built the Overholser Mansion which is a showplace today in Oklahoma City. He was one of the original Board of Directors of the St Louis & OKC Railroad. Henry suffered a stroke while on tour in Europe in 1911, and lingered as an invalid until his death.

Those of us that come to the Overholser Mansion for our First North American O Reunion will now be able to have a better understanding of this most famous O family. Henry's brother Levi has descendants in the area. Henry's descendants live in Kansas City.

Where Do We Go From Here?

When Barbara Ford began compiling the O family lines in the 1980's, she was blanketed with very many O descendants who helped to tabulate the families throughout North America. She made the correct decision to only print the first five generations in America. Trying to do more would have tied up the project to the point of non-publication. From the 1995 publication till her passing in 2007, Barbara continued collecting materials, compiling what she could, and separating them into files. This has made life so much easier for me, and whoever follows me.

But Barbara had lost all her computer files during a file transfer. So after I received the files in November 2007, I realized the need the get the files onto the computer. This is the only way we can find lost connections in a timely fashion. Hunting for one person through seven stuffed filing drawers is not something anyone wishes to, or has time to, do. It will take about another year to finish getting all the names on computer. Considering I still work for a living, I just am not able to do as much as I would like. We still have a file of over 100 people who have not been connected. I hope that you all can be patient with the process.

The question has been raised as to why not just put all the files on-line. The vast majority of the files are dis-connected, and many of the older letters and notes are mixed family lines. If we were to put these files out to the public without any organized format, it would set genealogy back fifty years. At our local Reunion this year, I will be bringing a few of the letters from the files. They will show how as many as a dozen different family lines are mixed together in just two or three pages. Without constant study of the families, there would be no way to separate these mixed groups of people.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Once the family lines have been compiled onto the computer, we can do an easier search for the missing connections. Additional information will be much easier to add, and search time will be greatly reduced. This is number one on our agenda. Helping each family connect with their past is the primary purpose the Association was started. And it took 100 years to reach this present milestone.

For the time being,, the OFA Bulletin will continue to concentrate on going backwards from the book. The majority of people are interested in connecting as far back as possible. This is being made a bit easier since there are now only a few people left from which to choose. Although admittedly some lines may never connect back to Europe.

We will be voting at this year's Reunion as to future publications. At present I am giving direct lines to those hunting for their family without cost. That should not change, as direct lines are not copywriteable. We need to vote on having CD's of O Lines available for \$8, cost going for S&H, and for building a kitty for future paper publications. Some would say "Why paper"? Well for security freaks like me, who believe in magnetic storms from outer space! Paper pubs could have additional stories and articles, and especially pictures of people & home-life. We wish to hear your ideas at the Reunions this year.
