107th Annual Reunion August 3, 2013



Hinges in History - Two O Families caught in the Civil War

150th Anniversary Special Article

When I started working in a machine shop in the mid nineties, I operated computerized lathes and mills. At times I would run into a problem which caused the part to be formed improperly, and not as the computer program intended. Checking the cutter which made the finish cut did not reveal anything out of order. My supervisor one time made the comment: *Sometimes the cause comes from the process just prior to what happened*. After investigating the prior action of the lathe, I found that the rougher used to initially remove the bulk of the material was damaged, thus the finish tool could not make a smooth cut, and I ended up with a poor part. Thus I had a hinge in the history of the part which caused a major change in the outcome of that part.

There are also hinges in history, which the outcome would have been different, if a prior event would have changed the dynamics of the next event. I found this to be the case just prior to one of the biggest events of the Civil War, the Battle of Gettysburg in July 1863. That year, the great great grandfather of D Ray Heisey, Jacob E Heisey, received a letter from the Christian Oberholser family of Franklin County. ML2114 Bishop Christian Funck Oberholser Jr, born July 26, 1803 Fredericksburg, Bethel Twp Lebanon Co PA, and his second wife Frances (Frany) Heisey, born March 24, 1804 sister to Jacob E Heisey, were living on Rowe Run Road, one mile north of Greene Village in Greene Township and wrote a letter that is still in the family but in somewhat poor condition. Christian Jr was a minister & bishop of the River Brethren Church. The letter documents a very underestimated dissipation of resources, keeping them out of the hands of the Southern Army. The letter was dictated by daughter Barbara Oberholser (1844-1920), the middle of three children. Her parents could not write, as found in the signing of a deed transfer to son Martin.



The Confederate invasion came from the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia up to Pennsylvania beginning on June 15th. (World Book Ency) Scouts were sent ahead, and entered Chambersburg on that day. They had been informed of many horse raising farms in Franklin County, and were in need of re-supplying the troops. Chambersburg and its surrounding farms became a staging area to prepare for battle with the Union forces. General Lee informed his officers (Confederate General Orders Number 72) " to avoid injury or destroying private property, and to appropriate horses, cattle, & other goods..." A shortage of officers made that order almost impossible to enforce. On June 23, 1863 Rachel Cormany recorded that the Rebels destroyed the Scotland Train Bridge, which was just two miles from the Oberholser farm. The local newspaper at the time reported that the Confederates "wanted horses more than anything else." Amos Stouffer noted in his diary for June 26, 1863 that " Lee's Army is in our valley" of Newburg -"about 90,000 men". The number was a bit of an exaggeration, for the Union Army had that number at Gettysburg, but the Confederate Army was 75,000 strong.


The Confederates were clearly seeking horses. One Confederate soldier wrote that they have taken "1600 very fine horses from the citizens." In 1860 Chambersburg had about 5200 residents. Most of the horses would have been in the vicinity of the town. An 1868 Atlas of Greene Township, Franklin County reveals the following farms west of the small village of Scotland were the bridge was destroyed. Levi Horst and Christian Oberholser Jr on the northwest, Jacob Martin, J Ebersole, J Brechbill, H Wingert, J Zook to the west, and further southwest were Daniel Lehman, Samuel Lehman, and Col A K McClure are notable farms in this area. SL22325 Amos Stouffer, grandson of SL223 Elizabeth Hoover Oberholtzer & Jacob Hershey Stouffer Sr, lived east of Chambersburg. On June 23rd his diary date notes that "The Rebs are coming again. J Landis got me to take his horses down the valley this morning." Amos mentions "again". This implies that some of the horses in the southeast were left idle, with plans to pick them up on the way back from farms further to the west. But the Confederates met with a huge surprise when they came to the farms in western Greene Township.

Bishop Christian's letter states that the Southern soldiers "camped just a mile above Green Village." This would have placed them right in the surroundings of the Oberholser Farm. The local newspaper later wrote that "fully five hundred [horses] had been taken from Chambersburg and vicinity to the mountains." Karl Oberholser had written down "My father, Christian [ML21142.76 Christian Lesher Oberholser 1907-

1994] told a story about the farmers hiding their horses in a valley, which is now called Horse Valley, beyond Blue Mountain." It is believed that the young men and boys of the farms were the ones who drove the horses over the mountain, and stayed with them until the Confederates were gone. This four week period was a trying time for the locals, in which no one would have dared to go into the mountain to inform the herders, for fear of being followed.

Horse Valley is a beautiful narrow valley north of present day Bear Valley in Franklin County. We stopped and talked with eighty year old George at Mountainside Pet Rescue. A jovial spirited man, he is the only one who knows the oral history of the valley. He tells how a Mr Mailmen* was the first to inhabit the valley, arriving in 1789. A Rosenberry* family moved in sometime later, and the families intermarried and owned much of the land in the northern end of the valley. These two families are buried in a secluded area cemetery on the north end of the valley. Also in a nearby location is a cemetery for the Hessians (German mercenary soldiers fighting for the British) who moved there most likely at the end of the War of 1812. It most likely would have been these Hessians who gave permission to bring the horses into the valley from Greene Township.

Avery first took us to the Scotland train bridge that was burnt by the Confederates. The drawing of the wooden train bridge was drawn in 1856. The concrete bridge was not built until some years after the Civil War. This is known for certain because the first portland cement plant was built in Coplay PA in 1871. Just northwest of there, he also showed us where Lee's Army set up camp. Today this mostly level area is a housing development. The Conococheaque Creek is close by, although there is a vertical bank to get to it. Lee's Army must have been in a hurry while heading north. They basically ignored the southern section of Path Valley, an area that was well known for harboring former slaves from the underground railroad. And Horse Valley is just over the mountain to the west of Path Valley. A single Rebel flag flew in Path Valley for part of a day, only to be taken down overnight by the locals. It also is not fully understood why Lee didn't go straight to Harrisburg and capture the unguarded capitol of Pennsylvania. But a village would mark the reverse in course, as it became known as Lee's Crossroads.

The Confederate General Jenkins was "sore with disappointment at the general exodus of horses from this place." (Ayers, 2003, p 404) Christian Oberholser's neighbor Levi Horst was threatened to be killed if he did not reveal the location of the horses. But he did not yield to their demand. The humble nature of the local farmers was enough to deter the soldiers from retaliation. As Scripture states, *A soft answer turns away wrath*. (Proverbs 15:1) Still, Avery Zook mentioned that the Rebels did confiscate 400 bushels of oats, 3 head of cattle and one horse from the Oberholser farm. The average yield of oats is 54 bushels per acre. So 400 bushels would take only 8 acres of ground. Being generous and giving another 10 acres for house, barn and cattle grazing, there was still another 88 acres to the farm for raising horses.

If half that is used for winter hay & grain, there would still be 44 acres used for raising horses. One horse needs one acre to graze on. So the Oberholser farm may have had about 40 horses which went into hiding. It is reasonable to calculate that the ten farms above would have produced a few more than 500 head of horses which went into hiding.

The question comes to mind, were 500 horses enough to change the tide of a battle involving over 75,000 men on each side? I suggest that it likely could have. It has been estimated that one horse is equivalent to 4 to 5 soldiers. But I suggest that even in Biblical days, 300 men could conquer thousands. At Gettysburg, a strong horse regiment could outflank the opposition. Or, they could have moved cannons. On July 2nd, Lee tried to crack the Union forces on the left in order to roll up Cemetery Ridge.



On July 3rd, they held the ridge for only about 20 minutes. An additional 500 horses used to rush supplies may have been all Lee needed to refrain from sending Pickett parading across a field. It is only a possibility of afterthought. But it very well could have changed the entire dynamics of the battle, and possibly delaying the outcome of the war. Five hundred horses could easily be worth the loss of Lee's 20,000 casualties. In Biblical history, its stories enlighten and gives clues, such as Gideon and Samson.

Update on JT, IC, & MC Lines

I recenty received a forward from John Shinpaugh from our dear friend in West Overton area of Pittsburg, Karen R Critchfield. She was contacted by Robert Kent Smith after his visit to the Abraham Overholt Distillery Building. Along with the family tree connections to the IC Robert Crane Overholt family line was an article by J Winfield Fretz. In the article *Wilderness, War and Gemeinschaft*, Fretz mentions a report of John Ruth in his book *Maintaining the Right Fellowship*. It made me re-read the book and realize there needed to be some updating. It should be noted over the past two centuries, there have been books written which lumped together information, in order to reveal some other sense of importance other than family ties. Now that our O Family Lines have been compiled after the initial years of immigration, we are able in some instances to look into these older books and documents and distinguish which lines these individual accounts belong.

JT "Tory" John Overholt 1738 - 1780 New York

Tory John farmed on the "very western" bank of the Delaware River in Tinicum Township, Bucks Co PA. He is NOT the grandson of Immigrant MC Marcus Oberholtzer who settled on the bank of the Sckullkill River in Chester County PA.

Mill operator Tory " JohnOverholt of Tinicum Twp in Bucks Co Pennsylvania, who was suspected of being guilty of treason by the American revolutionists and then fled to British controlled Staten Island, where he died."

- Second Report of the Bureau of Archives, Province of Ontario, by Alexander Frazer, 1904 p 972 Tory John is listed with the wrong Abraham in Gary Culp's article. - DLO

Elizabeth made several appeals to the British, one in June of 1781, without success.

In John Ruth's book, Pg 161, is the story of Abraham at the time he joined Butler's Raiders, and was arrested while stealing horses.

Abraham Overholt wrote a petition in 1787 while in Canada, concerning Tory John leaving his wife and son John who was about 16 years old, and Abraham's son, all in Bucks Co. on Tory John's farm.

It should be noted that John Overholt Jr is NOT IC3 John Overholt, who was born about a decade later. JT2 has not been accounted for as having children. Nor do we know the whereabouts of JT3 Sally.

Some of the information in John Ruth's *Maintaining the Right Fellowship* can now be properly traced. During the 1980's, an Overholt family in Sweden claimed their ancestor John was born in Canada in 1779. (REF: Maintaining the Right Fellowship, John Ruth, Pg 160) Harlan Paul Overholt Sr was this person in Sweden, who is IC31165.1 on our computer records.

Also in John Ruth's book, pg 159, Martin & Jacob, sons of immigrant MC Marcus Oberholtzer, settled Deep Run. This is correct. MC14 Henry Overholt is referred to on pages 186 & 170.

Pg 172 in John Ruth's book, Henry Ruth (Rott) married Staats' daughter Mary. Their son John enlisted in the 1812 war as a drummer boy at the age of 12-14 years old.

Pg 175 in John Ruth's book, refers to MC19 Abraham H Overholt & Magdelena Detweiler.

OUR BARBARIAN ROOTS Family Growth on Oberholtz Mountain

As the top of the mountains in Eastern Switzerland became filled by each family, the brothers would divide the mountain. One family would remain on the top of the mountain and continue to farm and herd. The other family (usually the youngest) would move down the mountain into the valley areas to clear land and raise plants and grain which could not withstand the weather on top the mountain. In the valley below Oberholtz was the town of Wald (means "forest"* or wood). The younger Oberholzer son moved across the mountain above Wald, and actually began on the "Aa", the spring in the "Thal" or valley. The younger brother built a house at the Aa. As it grew into a village it became known as Aathal, meaning "spring in the dale or valley." The town of Wald grew more rapidly below the Aathal. This is possibly in large part due to housing the workers and slaves of the dominate Oberholzer households, and the Oberholzer Corporation which made church furniture. The logs from the grove of trees between Wald & Oberholz were easier to haul down to Wald too mill & carve.

This same style of population growth is found on the west side of Lake Zurich. The families of Landis, Brubacher, Zug, and many others followed this same style of agricultural growth and population progression.

By the beginning of the 17th century, the family expanded into an upper and lower house. "The lower house also spelled their name Oberholzer, until after they moved to America." The present Oberholzer's used the upper house since about 900 A.D.[^] Due to the shortage of employment, most of the children would move to other areas of Switzerland and Bavaria to find or use their skills. This, as well as losing some sons to the continual war skirmishes over the next five centuries, and plagues thinning the family, led to the ability to trace the Oberholtzer family back to the 1400's with only one parental ancestor.

Lower house resident Jacob Oberholtzer is called (by Rosy Overholser who runs the hotel in Oberholtz) the "erster bekannter Vorfahre". In English this means "the first well-known ancestor". Rosy also described him as being a "burger and bauer". The former has a double meaning. It means a middle-class resident, which farmers who owed their land during feudal times would have been. But the word also means "underhaus", which is a reference to the progressive expansion of the family lands. A "bauer" is a small farmer and/or husbandman. Rosy must be pretty certain of this information, or she would not associate us with their family. These definitions are a confirmation that our ancestor in Aa/Wald came from the 'lower' house and can safely be traced to the Oberholzer 'upper' house which was situated in the present village of Oberholz. This type of homestead settlement was typical of many Alemanni families in the Zurich area.
