OUR BARBARIAN ROOTS

Personal Characteristics

The Historic Note-book was the name of one of my grandfather's books handed down to me. In it their are a few comments on the ancient Germanic tribes. One of these goes back to the times Before the Christian Era. Evidently, the "Ancient Germans considered long hair a mark of high birth." This line of thought reminds me of the ancient Hebrew Nazarite vow taken by Samson, and a thousand years later by Jesus Christ. Uncut hair on a male was an ancient sign of spiritual strength. I wonder sometimes how many of our ancestors lived by this code of honor.

According to Julius Caesar, the Suevi people were the largest and most warlike of the Germanic tribes. Suevi is the name from which the Germans who used the High-German dialect called themselves. It was not until these Suevi crossed the Rhine River that they began being called Alemanni by the French Gauls.

The name Alemanni, meaning "the union of all men", reflects a later form of tribal formation. This term was not used until the addition of various tribal refugees with the Suevi in south-western Germany and Alsace-Loraine of present France. The Alemanni were of Suevi origin, and occupied the region from Main to the Danube in the early Third Century A.D..**

It is worth mentioning the following quote, although I do not agree that the Alemanni were completely "heathen" by the time they settled Switzerland. "At the time they settled in Switzerland the Alamanni were heathens, and worshiped nature deities - in groves, near springs, or mountains - the names of some of which we still trace in the names of the days of the week. Their religion, which was common to all Germany, reveals the German mind - full of reverie, deep thoughtfulness, and wild romantic fancy that leads to a tragic issue." *

An Amish Overholt Family

In the OFA files we have had the John Shutt Overholt family for quite some time. In 2017, Will Overholtzer of California began sending the archives of John L Overholt who resided at Kilmarnock VA before leaving this earth for a better home. John's wife had copies made of the his life's genealogical work, and sent them to Will after John's passing. In them, there was an autobiography booklet by William J Overholt.

John Shutt Overholt was not Amish in his younger years. His second wife was Amish while in France, and remained so when they came to America. Author William J Overholt contends that the French Amish Church is more liberal than the American Amish. The interesting aspect that I find in this family, is how they moved around so much. This is not a usual characteristic which most "English" speaking folk think of the Amish.

AN EDITORIAL IN LOVE TO OUR AMISH COMMUNITY

While I struggled with the idea of addressing this issue, I feel it necessary to discuss this, not to change anybody's mind, but rather in hope that we may better understand each other.

I live and work among the Amish of Lancaster County PA. I have spent many a day learning the ways of the Plain Folk. I respect them enormously, and even try to live a simpler life because of it. What I wish to discuss, is the New Testament view of some of our differences.

The spirit-filled life.

Most of us read the Holy Bible in English or German. That is a good thing, for more and more are not reading the WORD at all, to their detriment. But to get to the original thought of the Scriptures, one needs to go into the original languages, which for the most part is Hebrew and Greek.

One of the draw-the-line issues with the Amish is inflated tires. So what does that have to do with the spirit? Well, in the Hebrew, the word $\Box \Box \Box \Box$ (ruwach, roo'-akh) is the

word for wind, as well as breath, and spirit. So technically, when a person is in a motor vehicle or a bicycle, they are being carried by the wind in the tires. Metaphorically speaking, they are also being carried by the spirit.

It is a most interesting true analogy. Just food (or air) for thought.

Pictures in light of graven images.

While some of the Amish folk are not shy of the camera in recent months, the older population especially are very adamant about not having their picture taken. They feel this is a graven image of themselves, and they would be breaking one of the Ten Commandments should they have one. I do not deny this from an Old Testament viewpoint. This is something I do not take lightly, and have wrestled with for years - until I discovered something very valuable and no longer disputable.

For decades the scientific world has performed experiments on what is known today as the Shroud of Turin. Records indicate that the Shroud has a history that goes back to the Crucifixion of Jesus Christ, and many believe it to be the very burial cloth of our LORD. Why is this important to what we are talking about?

There is no doubt anymore as to the legitimacy of the Shroud of Turin. It is beyond doubt that of our Lord's Crucifixion. While there are ney-sayers, all the objections have been proved false. We now have physical evidence of the first photographic image (by radiation) of the Creator of the Universe. Yes it is in a distorted fashion, but computer whises have re-constructed his body figure. We now know what Jesus Christ looked like.

In light of this, it implies that the Old Testament Covenant has been ful-filled by Our Lord! We no longer have to live under a law which condemns us to death. We are delivered from the Statue Law through the power of the Holy Spirit, if we have accepted Jesus Christ as our Savior. Therefore, while we still must live within the means of government laws, we are free from eternal condemnation. The Ten Commandments refer to a graven image as one which is worshiped. It is not the image that is a sin, it is the worship of that image which is a sin. Even the Shroud of Turin is not an object we are to worship. It is evidence of the acts taken against the Savior of the World. Evidence which points to a verification of the Scriptures. It is not to be idolized.

Do we need to fear a graven image of ourselves anymore? Not in light of New Testament truths.

You think about that, and feel free to comment. Praise the Lord!

The Weather Factors of Immigration

Pennypacker did research at the Public Records Office in London years ago and stated how the first Germans to come to America were recruited by William Penn from Crefeld near Frankfurt-on-the-Main in Germany. The group of 33 Mennonites [and Quakers] were closely associated in business. In fact, many were linen weavers who learned to weave flax after arriving in Penn's Woods. With these immigrants in the following years were Rittenhouse, Hans Jacob Groff of 1696 who later moved to Paradise then Groffdale; Oberholtzer in 1702 (now known as Jacob Oberholtzer of Franconia Twp, and the Kolb family in 1707.

Martin Matthew Oberholtzer and Martin Michael Oberholtzer arrived in Germantown in 1709 with the first Conestoga settlers, which spent the fall laying out the properties at future Willow Street. The group returned to Germantown to spend the winter and wait for their families coming on the next boat from England. While Matthew & Michael did not remain at Willow Street, the others joined the group in 1710 at Germantown and signed the warrant in October 1710.

While there has been some discrepancy as to the first group arrival in 1709 for Conestoga, there needs to be an understanding of process. The 1710 arrivals got off the boat on September 25th at Penn's Landing in Philadelphia. They spent a day just getting to Germantown. It would have taken at least a week to get to the Conestoga settlement. They signed the Warrant on October 10th of that year. That only allows for a couple days to pick out and measure at least a dozen tracts of land covering several miles of territory. No surveyor of that time period would be capable of doing such a feat. Nor could a group of people walk the lands to decide which to spend their money. For these reasons, the documentation for an arrival in 1709 is quite logical. The decision to overrule the draw of straws, and keep the leader of the group, Pastor Hans Herr at Germantown over winter, and choose someone else to return to England only compounds the evidence. Hans Herr Junior was the one to sign the document in Europe, and come along on the ship in 1710. The properties were already chosen prior to their arrival.

While much has been said over the years about religious persecution being the chief cause of migration, there is a more urgent purpose for the move. There was a large migration of German Palatinates from Alsace to Rotterdam in 1709 as a refugee movement. This was the result of the War of Spanish Succession from 1702 throughout the decade. Queen Anne of England decided to import the refugees from Rotterdam to London, where they could prepare to come to America.

In Knittle's account of the times, the refugees of 1709 had had two successive crop failures, the most severe winter in many years and many had been victimized by the [quarantine] by French Troops, burning of houses, and destruction of orchards and vineyards. Knittle said the major motivation for emigration was economic rather than religious.

Taking these factors into account, one must make a balanced view of the times. There is no doubt the Anabaptist Religion was a major factor of persecution. But we must realize this was a long-term problem that was still without solution. The economic depression of the same group of people created an urgent need to move, out of clear necessity. Without these environmental factors, our chances of being born in America would have been greatly diminished. Thank God for controlling the weather!

Overholser Family Association 111th Annual Reunion August 5, 2017

The 111th reunion of the Overholser Family Association convened at St John's Center United Church of Christ on Saturday, August 5, 2017. Twenty-seven people were in attendance.

The day began with a social time and lunch and a group photograph.

Michael Martin, President, welcomed the group to the 111th reunion and thanked Gordon Gerhart III for taking minutes for the 2016 Reunion.

He noted that Jim and Kathy Overholser were currently on a trip to Switzerland. Before they left, Dennis Oberholtzer asked for their assistance doing some research and Michael asked Dennis to explain his request. Dennis came across a letter from John Overholt referencing a 1939 letter saying the Consul in Switzerland had been told that the Overholsers originated in the Lake Constance area on the border of Switzerland and Germany. It mentioned the existence of family literature going back to 900-1200 A.D. Dennis asked Kathy and Jim to find a contact who might help locate this literature.

Michael asked the group to sign a 100th birthday card for Ruth Overholser (Spencer's wife). Ruth always led the singing of the OFA Reunion song at reunions. Earline Oberholtzer read the lyrics to the song which was written in 1919 by Edwin L Watts. Ruth added verses to it in 1986 celebrating Spencer's 30th anniversary as President of the Association.

The deaths of four OFA Members since the last reunion were noted: Ruth Oberholtzer, who also ran the Culp Family Association; Earnest Weinhold, a past President of OFA; Chet Carroll, husband of Carol Carroll, current secretary of OFA; and Barbara O Munson, Michael Martin's aunt, who introduced him to the OFA.

Members present then introduced themselves.

Dennis reported that the OFA book on the first five generations in the United States will be reprinted. One hundred copies will be made. After that it will be printed on demand. An addendum will be added to the new printing. Will Overholtzer, who was a member of the original book committee, has been sending his archives to Dennis who has begun going through them. They contain a great deal of new material including information about the original Swiss family members and Overholsers in Canada. There is also a notebook from the Kretcher family about a family member who served as a doctor on the first Union submarine during the Civil War. Dennis has created an index guide to the contents of OFA Bulletins to be posted on the website and also on Facebook.

Geoffrey Martin, Treasurer, reported a balance in the checking account of \$50.00, savings account \$2736.20, book account \$12,606.53, and special (lunch) account \$2000.35. He urged members to reach out to more family members to join the Association. He also suggested trying to cut down on the mailing of physical copies of the Bulletin to save on printing and postage by getting members on the e-mail list to receive the Bulletin. Reminders about the Reunion can be sent that way as well. Kris Overholt is working on creating a Google forum where members can discuss and share with others information on their family line.

Dennis discussed our immigrant ancestor's journey and settling in Lancaster County PA. In 1710, the first and second (or possibly second and third, as records are unclear) Overholsers came to America and settled in Lancaster County. There is a debate about whether they came from Newcastle, Delaware, or from Germantown, Pennsylvania, via Penn's Landing. Dennis has concluded that they arrived via Germantown.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned and Ella Rydzewski presented a program on her book *Starting Over in the Past* is her first work of fiction. She noted that Jesus used stories sometimes to make a point and she hoped her book did so as well.


On **Friday night, August 3rd**, we will meet at Yoder's between New Holland and Blue Ball for a 6:00PM buffet dinner and visiting.

PLAYING CATCH-UP WITH OLD MATERIALS

Former OFA President Will Overholtzer from California has graciously sent his genealogy records to the OFA. This is quite extensive, and we give a special THANK YOU to him and his wife for sharing such a huge amount of research. These records include the research of John L Overholt of Virginia. The two of them did extensive travels to Europe in search of Oberholzer family records. They also have compiled many notebooks full of information on many of the family lines here in North America.

While it will take quite some time to cross-check the several cases of information, Dennis is compiling the largest groups of undocumented people as a first need. This includes:

Over 2200 Overholzers in Europe, which is based on several groups of information. Much is now coded with Barbara Ford's coding system, but still needs more added before a finished product can be achieved.

The early O lines in Canada. There are extensive unfamiliar records of the Canadian O's in these files. I believe this info will correct many mistakes, and grow the lines associated with them.

Pictures of the immigrant homesteads will help to visualize our past.

These are just the most immediate surprises in this wonderful trove of documents.
