Spencer Overholser and Robert Oberholser. The act of reading any OFA Bulletin issue from 1979 to present is something that is now very easy to do with just a couple of clicks on the OFA website thanks to the collaborative efforts of the OFA, both online and offline.

In the past few years, we've worked together to set up important technical foundations that stabilized in 2018, including a website with more than 120,000 visitors from around the world, an online hierarchy to archive and organize our family's historical documents, a discussion group that has grown to more than 20 members and 10 posts, and more than 20 family lines that are now online and readily accessible thanks to the efforts of Dennis and other OFA researchers

OUR BARBARIAN ROOTS

The Fifth to Sixth Centuries A.D.

The following is a chronological series of events dealing with the Alemanni Tribe. At this point in time, the Tribe's name was confined to the south-western lands of present Germany, and the French lands of Alsace. Some of the Alemanni waring tribal groups also were fighting their way into northern Italy. They were being pushed out of present day Central Germany and Bavaria by larger Teutonic Tribes trying to expand their territory from the east.

In 407, a Roman usurper concluded a treaty with the Alemanni and the Burgundians for them to protect the Rhine River border.

- In 411, Jovinius usurped leadership. The Tribal Confederation included other Germanic tribal refugees, as well as non-German refugees from other waring lands round about. They commanded both sides of the Rhine River from Main to Alsace and Lorraine.
- 440's A.D.: "The deaths of Aetius and Emperor Valentinian relaxed ties which held the Barbarians of Gaul in peace and subordination. The sea-coast was infested by Saxons. The Alemanni and Franks advanced from the Rhine to the Seine."

 Edward Gibbon
- 458 A.D.: The Alemanni passed over the Rhaetian Alps, but were defeated in the Valley of Bellinzone on the Tesin River. The defeat of only 900 Barbarians does not reveal Italy's lack of power.
- 493 A.D.: But when [the Alemanni] invaded Cologne, Clovis was summoned to counter the invasion.

In 495, the Franks defeated the Alemanni in the South.

496 A.D.: Clovis forced back the Alemanni at the Battle of Tolbiac with great loss of life. The town of Tolbiac is present day Zulpich, near the city of Cologne.

Theodoric gained control of the Raetian hill country and in 506 he had organized enough power to demand a truce by the Franks for guarantees from further Alemannic attack.

In 507 the Alemanni sought aid from Theodoric without success.

This series of events laid the groundwork for moving the defeated Alemanni to a place of refuge in the Raetian Alps. Some were brought back from northern Italy. Some floundered south from the Black Forest. But most were families of Alemanni who had forced their way into Alsace and Lorraine. After the loss of power in that region, pressure was put on Theodoric to relocate the waring Alemanni in order to deter future rebellion. The Raetian Alps were the answer to Theodoric's problem.

Genealogy and Linguistics confirm Biblical Noah

Due to the account of Noah's Flood in the Bible, many people do not believe the Word of God. They would rather believe humans evolved, even when today there is scientific proof that DNA genes can not change enough to mutate from one species to another. But that is another matter. What has been found in other areas of science, that of linguistic research, and of genealogical records, give sound evidence that Noah's account is historical and can be trusted.

The Bible states that Noah and his sons and wives were saved by being on the ark (a large wooden barge). Eight persons in all. But in the Epic of Gilgamesh written about 2200 before the physical life of Jesus Christ, the writer says that those who helped build the ark were also with Noah. Another supposed contradiction are the many various traditions around the world which tell of others who have survived a world-wide Flood. And then there are many who say the ark could not have floated up to 14,000 feet in elevation, where it is reported to be today. So how does one reconcile these differing accounts?

One only needs to go to the ship records from the 1700's to find comparisons. Most of the English ship records that document the first several years of immigrants to America only record the name of the ship, the master of the ship, and the male passengers that were on the ship. They do not record the people who are being paid to operate the ship, such as the sail and rudder controllers, the cook and remaining crew. The records also do not record the names or number of wives on the ship. Nor do they count any children under the age of fourteen years. Here is a modern parallel to the account of Noah. The builders of the ark may very well have been on the floating barge! That does not contradict the Biblical account.

Another missed observance are the children. The Flood story notes only how Arphrachshad was born two years after the flood. That is meant to mean two years after the start of the deluge, which lasted 40 days and then continued to reside on the surface of the Earth for the first year. When we read of the genealogy records of that time, we find that Arphrachshad had two older brothers. That means that Elam and Asshur (Genesis 10:22) were on the ark also, just not recorded due to their age. Again, the Biblical record is not compromised!

As for the accounts around the world, they very likely did occur. Modern people easily miss the reality of the account of Noah. The Biblical text would have been written very close to the time of the event. Noah or one of his sons documented what they could SEE, just SEA. They could only see water. The ark did not have any power or sails, so they had no way to know if the water covered the entire Earth. All they could see is that it covered everything that *they* could see! Later, when they would bump into other people, the text of the account was not changed, because writing was considered sacred and may not be tampered with or you would be punished by God. And so we still have an original at-the-time account of the Flood of Noah.

As for the 14,300 feet of elevation in which the Ark sits today on Mount Ararat, there is a very scientific explanation for that also. Evolutionists wrongly believe it takes millions of years to create things here on Earth. Yet they come up with a Big Bang! The nihilistic thinking we have today is prevalent everywhere! Still, science leaves the realm of theory and becomes fact when something can be repeated and documented. Well, Mount St Helens in the western USA proved how mountains can change structure in a matter of hours. And while carbon 14 tests show the fresh lava is a billion years old, it was fresh as a daisy when it came out of the volcano. Quartz rocks, and other semi-precious stones were found to have developed during the explosion. It did not take millions of years to form them.

Mount Ararat has been found to be a hot-air volcano. That means, when the mountain was still flat land, underground volcanic activity produced huge amounts of hot gases. These gases pushed the land upward, but did so in a way that it did not break open and release the gases. Now how can we prove this? In 1840 and 1883, there were massive earthquakes on the mountain. It caused the northwest side of the mountain to collapse within, creating what we call today the Ahora Gorge. How could it collapse inside, unless there was nothing inside? It was empty due to the hot-air volcanic activity!

Another form of proof is in Language. Linguistics tells us that the Flood left the ark on the mountain of Ararat. In the *Epic of Gilgamesh*, written two millenia before the birth of Christ, there are two words the translators left in the original language, only changing the Sumerian letters to English letters. *Ni Zer* is a word which means "white crown". Noah and Gilgamesh are talking at the base of Mount Ararat, and Noah explains: *The ark lay upon Mt Niser. It held it and the ark did not move.* A second description of Ararat uses the term *nazir*, meaning "harsh crown". At another place in the text Noah says: *Zeh Zer* which means "This crown". Noah was disscussing the mountain while he pointed to it saying "This crown". Here are two words that the translators either deliberately left in the original, or they did not know what they meant. I personally find the latter hard to believe.

There is no longer any reason for a person to not believe the Flood account. Either a person chooses to ignore the Scripture to their own detriment, or that person will accept the fact that there is a Higher Power than themselves. Our frailty as we age is often a way to realization. We are not all-powerful, but the Creator is!

The following person <u>may have been</u> the ancestor of this family, but it has not been confirmed. Previous listing of Valentine was incorrect. Valentine is the immigrant ancestor of the Bucks Co line, and the family is Mennonite. This family line has roots in the Lutheran Church, and became more Evangelical. Conrad Renner is the only other documented immigrant to have arrived prior to the birth of 2-1 William Renner.

?1-1 Conrad Renner Immigrant to America October 30, 1738 from the Palatinate on the ship Elizabeth, George Hodgson commander, left from Rotterdam with the last pickup at Cowes. Conrad's name was written by a clerk. 41 men are listed of the 95 passengers.

Samuel Moyer's school was also a singing school in Clinton in May 1836, conducted by Samuel Fry. Moses Overholt, Jacob Overholt, and Elizabeth Overholt were students there. These would have been MT222 Jacob H Overholt and wife Mary Elizazbeth, and IC71 Moses R Overholt born in 1810 Lincoln Co ONT.

OVERHOLSER FAMILY ASSOCIATION 112th Annual Reunion August 4, 2018

The 112th Reunion of the Overholser Family Association convened at St John's Center United Church of Christ on Saturday August 4, 2018. Thirty-one people were in attendance.

The day began with a social time, officer's meeting and lunch.

Kris Overholt, President, welcomed the group to the 112th Reunion. Those present introduced themselves.

Kris told the group about his experience of finding the OFA organization and how John Shinpaugh helped him to find the link to his JL Line. He is committed to helping others find information on their family roots through the overholser.net website. The site has had 107,000 visits and Kris noted that activity particularly spiked at two points: first when all of the OFA Bulletins (which are keyword searchable) were added to the site and second when the family lines were added. Visitors spend an average of 3.5 minutes viewing the site; most viewed lines in order were: JC, MC, AS, SL, JA. The majority of visitors have been from the US (63%), followed by 20% from France, 3% from China and Canada, 1% from Germany and Peru. Fifty percent visited the Home Page, 20% history, 17% family Lines, 14 % Historical Documents, and 11% OFA Bulletins. Most also viewed the coat-of-arms.

Kris has added a discussion group to the website for people to ask questions and allowing others to respond. He encouraged members to register for the discussion group, review the questions and interact with visitors. He noted that everything on the website is archived so all materials are safe from being lost. He reported that the officers met prior to the general meeting and are looking to give Dennis Oberholtzer some assistance, especially on computer issues. Michael Martin and Rick Overholt are contributing to help him acquire a new computer. Kris & Geoff will help set up a g-mail e-mail account and transfer documents to a Google site. Also discussed at the officer's meeting was digitizing the remaining paper files which are substantial. There is an opening for a second vice president; anyone interested can contact one of the officers.

Geoffrey Martin, Treasurer, reported that 240 new books have been received. We still owe about \$600 for printing. Since the last reunion, \$613 in donations have been received. Account balances are: Primary Checking \$60.00; Primary Savings \$2,413:87; Book Fund \$9529.31; Lunch Fund \$2509.51. Carolyn O Kendall audited the accounts.

Dennis Oberholtzer reported that he had been visited by Bruce McCrea, a member of the AB Abraham line, who is from Michigan. Bruce looked at some of the material Dennis has, trying to find out how his family came to move to Bedford PA. While here, he also visited Noah Oberholtzer Jr, whose son's farm in Bedford overlaps Bruce's family's original farm.

Dennis expressed appreciation to the younger members of the association who have been seeking new ways to get information out to family members. Some of Dennis' current research deals with the European family lines. He has been compiling data from the 1500's to the 1900's, and has found a link to the HJ Hans Jacob Oberholtzer line to Europe.

Finally, Dennis told the group that his wife Earline has been in charge of the kitchen and flowers for the reunion for several years and would like someone to replace her in this job after the next two years.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned and Beth Oberholtzer, author of *Plain Meetinghouses*, spoke to the group.

Presentation by Beth Oberholtzer:

Beth is the author of *Plain Meetinghouses*, a book which documents in pictures and descriptions the old order Mennonite meetinghouses of Lancaster County. Along with photographer John Herr, she visited 22 meetinghouses after finding in a library a set of instructions on how to construct these places of worship. Initially, the Mennonites met in one another's homes, but as groups became too large, they began to construct sites for their meetings.


