SAMUEL OVERHOLTZER OF VIRGINIA

In 1981, MRS. HELEN OVERHOLSER TURN of San Angelo, Texas published the book, <u>Samuel Overholtzer of Virginia and Some</u> of his Descendants (Centex Press, Belton, Tex., 365 pp.) based on her research on her ancestor. She is still trying to locate his connections in Pennsylvania and would appreciate any information that anyone has. (Her address is Mrs. Wayne Turn, 2310 Rio Grande, San Angelo, TX 76901.)

The only Pennsylvania record she has been able to find is Samuel's marriage record as found in the Rev. Waldschmidt's baptismal and marriage records of 1751-1786 in Cocalico, Lancaster County:

"Samuel Overholss, s. of late Jacob Overholss, m. Maria Eva Hauswirth, dau. of late Christian Hauswirth, Sept. 8, 1765."

Samuel and Maria had 8 children, some born before they moved to what is now Shenandoah County, Va., where he bought 215 acres on Nov. 4, 1771 on the drain of Mill Creek near Mt. Jackson. In his will of May 29, 1772, he named as children Peter, Barbara, Eva, and Samuel. Four more children were born before he died in 1783: Ann, Veronica, Jacob, and Susannah. The will was probated Dec. 5, 1783 and estate inventory dated Jan. 31, 1784.

The book concerns the 3 sons, Peter, Samuel, and Jacob, the latter being Mrs. Turn's forebear. Peter remained in Virginia and raised his family, but his children moved to Ohio. Samuel stayed in Virginia, married and had several children before moving to Washington County, Tenn., then to Greene County, Tenn. where he died. Jacob was the first to move to Tennessee, first in Washington County and then Carter County where he married and had his family. He died young in 1825.

Jacob Oberholtzer who came to America on the ship <u>Samuel</u> in 1732 had with him a son, Samuel, age 3, and a daughter, Elizabeth, age 6. That Samuel could be the Samuel of Virginia but Mrs. Turn has been unable to document this.

OVERHOLTZERS IN IOWA

Every August there is an Overholtzer Reunion in Tingley, Iowa (Decatur County) that has been meeting since 1925. It was started by John E. Overholtzer and consists of descendants of CHRISTIAN OVERHOLTZER (1741-1819) who lived in Adams County, Pa. and is buried in the Zimmerman Cemetery in Liberty Township in that county near the Maryland line. (According to the Adams County Historical Society, there are 9 gravestones covering 17 Overholtzers in that cemetery and 11 stones covering 23 more Overholtzers in other Adams County cemeteries.)

Attendance at the Tingley reunion runs from 50 to 75, whereas years ago 150-200 attended. JOHN F. OVERHOLTZER of Tingley, who has volunteered to serve as a contact for their group, writes that they have never been able to find out anything about Christian. John and his wife visited the village of Oberholz in Switzerland in 1981 where they met ROSY OBERHOLZER, a member of our Association, who lives there. Another of our members who has done considerable research on the Overholtzers is Grace Overholtzer Milligan, 7511 Oak St., Kansas City, MO 64114.

In a list of Anabaptists living in Wadenswil, Switzerland in 1634, ELSI OBERHOLTZER, Jorg Hirzen, a widow with 9 children, is listed.

In the parish of Wald at the same time lived Caterina Furer, wife of BURKHART OBERHOLTZER, and in the same parish lived Margaretha Schollenberger, wife of MARTIN OBERHOLTZER. Apparently only the wives were Anabaptist. The husbands at that time were not.

ANOTHER ANNIVERSARY -- Remember the Bicentennial back in 1976, marking 200 years since America had declared its independence of Britain in 1776? Get ready for a TRIcentennial this year -- it's been 300 years (1683) since Mennonites came to this continent, and you can be sure the various Mennonite societies will be making much of this anniversary.

Glenn Lehman, editor of the 1981 Annual Report of the Lancaster Mennonite Historical Society, put it in a different perspective in that report.

ABOUT OUR MEMBERSHIP (cont)

The most numerous line represented, by far, is that of III Martin--IV Christian. A total of 139 of our members (37% of the total) are in that line. The other lines with more than 10 members are III Martin--IV John 29, III Martin--IV Elizabeth 23, and III Martin--IV Daniel 19.

We also have several descendants of III Martin--IV Jacob and IV Isaac, as well as III Christian--IV Samuel, IV John and IV Elizabeth, and III Maria--IV Christian, and III Samuel--IV Samuel. Some of our members, of course, have not been able to determine their linkage to the main Overholser lines.

These designations might be confusing to some, especially new members. A word of explanation might be in order. Members of the Association trace their lineage from Immigrant Samuel Oberholtzer who came to America in 1727. The second generation consists of his 6 children, designated as II Jacob, II Martin, II Elizabeth, II Ann, II Magdalena, and II Veronica. The main lines in the 3rd generation are the 8 children of II Martin with those of his sons, III Christian, III Samuel, and III Martin being the most thoroughly developed.

A chart depicting the first four generations is presently undergoing revision by President Spencer Overholser and will be available to members at some time in the future.
