OBERHOLTZER ARTICLE PUBLISHED

John L. Overholt of Kilmarnock, Va., one of the Association's pre-eminent researchers, is the author of an article in the October 1986 issue of PENNSYLVAN-IA MENNONITE HERITAGE entitled, "The Marcus Oberholtzer (1664-1725) Family," published by the Lancaster Mennonite Historical Society. The article is the result of 8 years' work and deals with the identification and correlation of all known Oberholtzers in Europe prior to emigration to America and a detailed description of Marcus's descendants. It is a valuable addition to the literature on this branch of the family.

56 ATTEND 77TH REUNION

The 77th annual reunion of the Overholser Family Association was held on Saturday, Aug. 23, 1986, in the Terre Hill (PA) Fire Hall and was attended by 56 people. The meeting was preceded by a covered-dish luncheon and a slide presentation featuring Oberholz, Switzerland, and the original Overholser farm in Lancaster County.

President J. Spencer Overholser called the meeting to order followed by the invocation by the Rev. John R. Weiler, Chaplain. The Secretary's minutes were approved as printed in the February 1986 BULLETIN. The financial report was submitted by Treasurer Marjorie Carroll and Auditor Robert Oberholser and approved as submitted. Necrologist Robert Oberholser submitted his report to the Secretary.

There was a displayof books on the history of Terre Hill brought by Michael Wenger, the town's official historian. An invitation from Elizabeth Oberholser Frey was read inviting members to the celebration of the 95th birthday of her father, Robert Oberholser, on Sept. 13 at their home in Freehold, N.J.

HAVE YOU CONTRIBUTED?

O.F.A. MEMBERS MAKE 'PILGRIMAGE' TO OBERHOLZ, SWITZERLAND

The ancestral home of the Oberholzers is the small alpine village of Oberholz near Zurich, Switzerland. It was the destination last summer of several members of the Association to attend an Oberholzer Reunion on June 22-23 at the restaurant/guest house owned by Rosy Oberholzer, a member of O.F.A., and her husband, Gottfried.

Member Darwin Overholt, a real estate man in Doylestown, Pa., took 11 members of his family (including his wife, mother, their children and grandchildren) on a two-week flying visit to Switzerland. After landing in Geneva and spending time in the 'Sound of Music' country around Interlaken and Zermatt, they arrived at Rosy's to join the 100 or so others for the Reunion. About half were from the U.S. (from Fla. to Calif.) with others from Europe and the Oberholz area. There were yodellers, an alpine horn trio, a brass band and singing by a family from Sarasota, Fla. (see below) as well as much fellowship and getting to know one another.

A great time was had by all! The next day, they gathered in the 1706 chapel and sang old hymns. They discovered that communication was no problem -- Darwin's mother, Margaret, spoke the Pennsylvania Dutch dialect which the Swiss understood perfectly!

Another American party left on June 4 on a 2-1/2 week singing tour of 13 Mennonite and other churches in Germany, France, Switzerland, and Belgium. They were the John J. Overholt family and friends from Sarasota, Fla. Included in the party were Assn. member Durand Overholtzer and his wife and son of Modesto, Calif.

John had been to Europe many times on singing tours and as a Mennonite relief worker. He is a minister and he and his wife Vera (a descendant of John Overholt (1820-1890)) operate the Christian Hymnary Publishers with their main work being the largest Mennonite

hymnal published (over 1,000 hymns). John had known Rosy since he became the first Mennonite Overholt to visit the ancestral home in 1950, when he arrived on a noisy motorcycle and scared the villagers off the streets! He is a descendant of Marcus Oberholtzer (1664-1725) who emigrated to America in 1710 with Hans Herr and others. (Incidentally, the reunion of the descendants of Vera's ancestor, John Overholt, will be held in Sarasota during Christmas vacation this year.)

A third group of Americans to visit Oberholz were members of a Swiss Study Tour led by Dr. Delbert Gratz, librarian and historian at Bluffton College, a Mennonite college in Bluffton, Ohio. They toured West Germany, France, Switzerland, and the Palatinate by bus from July 22-Aug. 12. They had discussions with Mennonite and other leaders, worshiped in Mennonite churches three Sundays, and stayed with Mennonite families and institutions as well as in inns and hotels. They visited Oberholz but not at the time of the reunion, although O.F.A. members John L. and Peg Overholt were at the reunion before joining the Gratz group. John also did research on the Oberholtzers in Europe before emigration. Assn. members Willard and Betty Oberholtzer of Rancho Cordova, Calif. were also in the group. Dr. Gratz has been taking study groups to Germany for 15 years and will lead another one this June 9-30.

(Note: After serving as hostess for so many American 'relatives', Rosy decided to come over and visit some of them. Darwin Overholt picked her up at Kennedy Airport 5 days before Thanksgiving and took her to Doylestown where she stayed with his mother. They got along famously because of no language barrier, went shopping for quilts among other activities. At Thanksgiving dinner, Rosy joined the 32 at the table! Since she is an avid reader of Pearl Buck's books, the Overholts took her to Miss Buck's grave and toured her home, then drove

A letter from JUDITH OBERHOLTZER (Mrs. William Henry) of PO Box 130, Flossmoor, Ill. 60422 gives the lineage of her husband. West Overton Village in western Pennsylvania is the site of the Abraham Overholt (1784-1870) homestead and distillery that flourished between 1840 and 1900. The distillery is now a museum and the Village is a National Historic District maintained by the Westmoreland-Fayette Historical Society which is researching the social, economic, and religious life of the Village's residents. PILGRIMAGE (Cont)
